

# Stour Music 2023

RE-ESTABLISHING THE FESTIVAL after lockdown, we made the decision to commission even more extravagant programmes – giving you something really exceptional to tempt you out of your homes.

We open with 'Angels & Demons', I Fagiolini's foot-tapping extravaganza with Brecon Baroque. Perhaps you'll come because of the Bach and Monteverdi but then go away amazed by the Neapolitan pantomime and the castanets in the Xácara!





On the first Saturday, Bach's St Matthew Passion (for double choir and orchestra) is performed by Bach specialists Solomon's Knot – one of six groups coming to Stour for the first time. On Sunday, we hear three Bachs (and more) in intriguing revoicings by debutants Corvus Consort and Ferio Saxophone Quartet.

Week two starts with a special Stour commission – a rare gathering of a 22 player Renaissance Wind Band in an hommage to pioneer David Munrow, one of the most inspiring early musicians of his

generation. This is the early music that excited me in my youth with high energy and instruments I'd never seen before: rackets, shawms, crumhorns and many more.

Beforehand, we'll have a short introductory round table with James Bowman and others that worked with Munrow, beautifully audible because of the church's new sound system (another significant investment by Stour Music).

Bach triple harpsichord concerts played by three masters provide another *hommage*, this time to harpsichord maker and Stour lynchpin Andrew Garrett who died in 2021, while our final celebration takes us to 17th-century Rome.

# Angels & Demons

Handel Pifa symphony (Messiah) Cristoforo Caresana La Tarantella (1673) Iribarren Xácara de Navidad (c.1750) J S Bach Nun komm, der Heiden Heiland (1713) Claudio Monteverdi Beatus vir (1640)

Alongside popular Bach and Monteverdi, a cast of animated characters in foot-tapping Baroque music.

From Naples, a Monteverdi-ish pantomime based on the myth of the spider bite. Virtuosic angels confuse shepherds with echo jokes: a hypnotic Tarantella dance wards off the devil (and his butch demons) before ending at the crib. From Spain a 'Xácara': 'ruffians and rogues, picaresque women -more high-spirited than criminal'. With castanets, percussion and guitars, 'Bato's little song' brings the Devil down in flames!

### The Triumphs of Oriana

Fair Oriana explores the public and private faces of Elizabeth I through song, movement, instrumental music and the Queen's own



poetry: a subtly theatrical journey from public monarch to private woman. With courtly, sometimes whimsical music as her 'triumphs', and intimate, domestic music as her 'trials', meet both halves of one iconic being. Works by Morley, Dowland, Milton and Louise Duggan.

# J.S.Bach St Matthew Passion Solomon's Knot

Sacred opera or sung sermon? Bach's St Matthew Passion balances between these two extremes, singers switching between the retelling of Jesus' suffering and death, and what that means to each one of us in the here and now. The congregation of listeners are embraced through the universalising power of familiar hymn tunes and texts.

Undertaking this totemic work for the first time as part of its 15th anniversary, Solomon's Knot does away with both vocal scores and conductor to bring an immediacy to Bach's masterpiece in an especially intimate and visceral performance.

Working again with director John La Bouchardière (St John Passion, Leipzig 2019) to explore this metaphysical interface, the group pushes the limits of how contemporary audiences interact with a work written to strike into the hearts of listening Saxons 300 years ago.

Incredibly rare to hear today, a specially-commissioned gathering of the clans: 22 players on recorders, strings, shawms, crumhorns, racketts, dulcians, bagpipes, hurdy-gurdy, cornetts, sackbuts, keyboards, lutes, guitars and percussion in thrilling instrumental and dance music of the Renaissance.

Conceived as an *hommage* to the recordings and TV appearances of early music icon David Munrow in the 1970s, this special event brings us the richness of Renaissance instrumental sounds and styles taken from collections published by Arbeau, Susato, Praetorius, Holborne and more.

# Reining in the donkey Music from 17th-century Rome

17th-century Rome saw incredible musical invention alongside a thriving freelance musical culture. On feast days the best singers would augment the regular ensembles at St Peter's and other churches to enable multi-choir extravaganzas. Orazio Benevoli (son of a pastry chef) was a 'fixer' for these occasions - and the most brilliant composer of four-choir masses. He was also master of the technique known as 'sostenere la mula' (reining in the donkey) which you will hear! Benevoli has almost disappeared from music history but Carissimi has fared better, notably with his bijou oratorio Jephte, with strongly drawn characters, echo effects and ravishing final chorus.

#### **Boughton Aluph Church**

All concerts during the festival take place in this beautiful Pilgrim church, set in the heart of the Kent countryside. The church is located just off the A28, about 4 miles from Ashford (Exit 9 from M20) and 10 miles from Canterbury. There are yellow Stour Music signs on the main Ashford to Canterbury road to direct traffic to the church and car park.

#### **Disabled Access & Parking**

The rural nature of its location means that access to the church for disabled patrons is not easy, and caution is advised. The ground in the car park fields can be uneven, and there is a short but steep path down from the marquee field and also leading up into the churchyard. As last year, disabled parking will be provided at the top of the main car park field, as close as possible to the entrance to the Festival Marquee. (Severely disabled people can be dropped off at the top of the lane at the entrance to the churchyard, and then cars parked in the normal manner.) There is level wheelchair access to the church via the South door, or by use of a ramp at the North door. St John Ambulance personnel will be on hand to give assistance where required.

## **Booking arrangements**

#### **Tickets**

- We are using TicketSource again this year as our online and telephone Box Office. When booking online, you will be sent an e-ticket with your booking confirmation; please present this on the door of the concert either on an electronic device or printed.
- Stour Music Friends have a Priority Booking period until General Booking opens on 11 April.
- There will also be a box office for tickets (purchase only). This will be located at the entrance to the festival marquee, and open 45 minutes before the start of each concert.
- Wheelchair spaces are available throughout the three price code areas. Please select one of these spaces when booking online or indicate to the ticket source team when booking by telephone.
- Concessions: 10% discount when booking for 6 concerts or more, with 50% discount for those in full-time education.
- Tickets cannot normally be exchanged or money refunded.


