

Stour Music 2024

FIREWORKS, A HANDEL OPERA, Flamenco, Alehouse and great choral music - what a way to spend a few days in this (normally) quiet country church on the Pilgrims' Way between Ashford and Canterbury.

We start 'at home' (at least for Stour) in early 17thcentury Venice and Rome with rhapsodic music for soprano and harp, before being whisked off to Spain for Flamenco. The Tango and the dance element of Tudor Night was much enjoyed previously and now we have a better stage so that everyone can enjoy



the footwork. On Saturday, the fireworks continue: both real ones after the concert and in a large orchestral Handel spectacular with soprano Anna Dennis.



Sundays are choirs days: on the first weekend, new consort/choir Lyons Mouth offers 16th and 19th-21st century masterworks. On the final Sunday we're at home to Mr Haydn with his wind band mass, and while we take tea in the tent afterwards, Boxwood & Brass play wind serenades.



We also offer a fully staged performance (with Baroque gesture) of Handel's opera *Orlando* (perhaps some of you will remember the late James Bowman in the role).



And what is 'currently the hottest early music act in Europe' (I quote myself) the Scandinavian freethinkers Barokksolistene with the force that is Mary Bevan in 'Purcell's Playground': I saw this in Norway - absolutely unmissable. Only this group could then top that with an outrageous late-night their now infamous 'Alehouse' which starts with Playford and Purcell and ends up... well, that depends on the night.

A masterpiece, it premiered at the King's Theatre in London in 1722



but ran for only 10 performances before falling into obscurity until the late 20th century (notably performed by the late James Bowman).

The plot centres on the love square between the knight Orlando, the princess Angelica, the prince Medoro and the shepherdess Dorinda, and leads to madness - even violence. Can the all-seeing sorcerer Zoroastro step in before it's too late? In this performance the singers use expressive physical movement in the style that Handel's own singers would have known.

'In a staging devised collectively (again in line with Baroque-era practices) by the singers themselves, any preconceptions of park-and-bark or overblown pantomime acting are put swiftly to bed.' *Bachtrack*


The Friends of Stour Music

Boughton Aluph Church

All concerts during the festival take place in this beautiful Pilgrim church, set in the heart of the Kent countryside. The church is located just off the A28, about 4 miles from Ashford (Exit 9 from M20) and 10 miles from Canterbury. There are yellow Stour Music signs on the main Ashford to Canterbury road to direct traffic to the church and car park.

Disabled Access & Parking

The rural nature of its location means that access to the church for disabled patrons is not easy, and caution is advised. The ground in the car park fields can be uneven, and there is a short but steep path down from the marquee field and also leading up into the churchyard. As last year, disabled parking will be provided at the top of the main car park field, as close as possible to the entrance to the Festival Marquee. (Severely disabled people can be dropped off at the top of the lane at the entrance to the churchyard, and then cars parked in the normal manner.) There is level wheelchair access to the church via the South door, or by use of a ramp at the North door. St John Ambulance personnel will be on hand to give assistance where required.

Booking arrangements Tickets

• We are using TicketSource again as our online and telephone Box Office. The TicketSource booking fee is 6.5% + VAT per booking. When booking online, you will be sent an e-ticket with your booking confirmation; please present this on the door of the concert - either on an electronic device or printed.

• Stour Music Friends have a Priority Booking period until General Booking opens on 11 April.

• There will also be a box office for purchase of tickets at the entrance to the festival marquee, which will open 45 minutes before the start of each concert.

• Wheelchair spaces are available throughout the three price code areas. Please select one of these spaces when booking online or indicate to the TicketSource team when booking by telephone.

• Concessions: 10% discount when booking for 6 concerts or more, with 50% discount for those in full-time education.


• Tickets cannot normally be exchanged or money refunded.
